GET INVOLVED IN THE PHA 5 YEAR PLAN

What Is the PHA Plan?

The PHA Plan is a comprehensive guide to public housing agency (PHA) policies, programs, operations, and strategies for meeting local housing needs and goals. There are two parts to the PHA Plan: the 5-Year Plan, which each PHA reviews and updates once every 5th PHA fiscal year; and the Annual Plan, which is prepared by the PHA every year. PHAs submit to HUD a PHA Plan Template, which includes specific plan elements but also information on where certain plan elements that are not required to be reviewed by HUD can be obtained locally. PHAs use the same PHA Plan Template for the 5-Year and Annual The entire PHA Plan (including all elements, not just those submitted to HUD) must be made available locally, typically at the main office of the PHA or on the PHA website.

During the month of April the Sacramento Resident Advisory Board (SRAB) and your community site manager will be meeting in your community to solicit your input and present plan information. See the chart on page five for dates and locations.

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MAINTENANCE CORNER BY GREG POTTS

A Basic Primer on Programmable Thermostats

If your apartment is equipped with a

digital programmable thermostat, you can learn to program it yourself.

First, press the "mode" button until you see "heat" or "cool" whichever you would like.

Press "program" until you see "set time". Move the up and down keys to the desired time you would like your unit to start heating or cooling. There are 4 settings; morning, day, afternoon, evening (or night), depending on the

thermostat. Set the time you like, then hit program again.

Each time you press program and

set the time desired, then press the "time/temp" button and set the desired temperature. After you set the temperature, hit program again. The optimum temperature for heating is 68 degrees, and the optimum temperature for cooling is 78. These temperatures are recommended for the most

energy savings while still keeping you comfortable.

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Healthy Homes = Healthy SHRA Communities

Did you notice a group of seven people walking around your apartment facility recently? They were measuring distances from buildings and taking pictures. It was the first step of the new project to bring designated outdoor smoking areas to nine or ten pilot SHRA sites. Staff from the American Lung Association's Project RESPECT, along with SHRA staff, and members of your Resident Advisory Board met with building managers to assist in finding the best outdoor spaces for designated smoking areas.

March 20, 2009, the team went to Mariposa Manor, Tiara Way, Gibson Oaks, Washington Plaza, Capitol Terrace, Sutter's View, Pine Knoll, Alder Grove, Rio Lane, and William Land Villa. The staff also provided building managers with information about secondhand smoke, free quit smoking services that will be coming to the sites, and other health-related resources that will be used by Project RESPECT over the next three years. In addition to protecting ourselves and our children from secondhand smoke, which we will be writing about more in the future, here are some tidbits about the effect of

secondhand smoke on our pets from the California Department of Public Health.

Did You Know?

Dog Facts

- Cancer-causing agents can be found in a dog's hair and urine for months after being around secondhand smoke.
- Dogs whose owners smoke are twice as likely to develop cancer.
 Long-nosed dogs tend to get nasal and sinus cancer; short nosed dogs tend to get lung cancer.

Cat Facts

- Secondhand smoke gets on a cat's fur. When a cat cleans itself, it gets a large dose of chemicals in the smoke.
- Cats who are exposed to secondhand smoke are three times as likely to develop lymphoma, a deadly cancer.



Bird Facts

- Birds have extremely sensitive lungs.
- Being around secondhand smoke may cause birds to have serious lung problems, including lung cancer.

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Fish Facts

- Smoke from burning tobacco can settle into home aquariums. Many of the poisons in secondhand smoke, including nicotine and ammonia, are highly toxic to goldfish.
- When cleaning aquariums, tobacco under fingernails or nicotine-stained fingers can also pollute aquarium water and poison your goldfish.

Are Smokefree Apartment Buildings Legal?

As a general rule, property owners are permitted to impose restrictions on their tenants unless those restrictions violate existing laws or are discriminatory. A smokefree policy is no different than a no pet, no loud music, or any other policy that protects other tenants' well-being or landlord's property.

Common law generally affords the owner with a right (and in some cases, obligation) to protect other tenants and the owner's property.
